Internet use for health information

- The World's largest medical library
- The third most common use of the internet
- Recognized as a new significance in health information and communication

Internet use for health information

- Access to health information is empowering
- Health seekers become “proactive”
- Information in privacy

Surfing the internet

- Amount of information can be overwhelming
- Information is unregulated
- Health seekers' search skills limited
- Readability measurement scores are low

What is diabetes?

Diabetes is a disease in which blood glucose levels are above normal. Most of the food we eat is turned into glucose, or sugar, which our bodies use for energy. The pancreas, an organ that lies near the stomach, makes a hormone called insulin that helps glucose get into the cells of our bodies. When you have diabetes, your body either makes less insulin or can't use its own insulin as well as it should. This causes sugar to build up in your blood.

Diabetes can cause serious health complications including heart disease, blindness, kidney failure, and lower-extremity amputations. Diabetes is the sixth leading cause of death in the United States.


